



New to Boating?

I am new to boating, but I would like to get into it. I am thinking about living on a boat, how do I get started? Which is better a power or sail boat? Is it safe to go on the ocean in a 16 (or whatever length) foot boat?

These are all questions that commonly appear on boating forums. It is plain by the way the person phrases the question, they know little to nothing about boats or the boating lifestyle. So where do they go?

Since they have asked the question it is also obvious they are eager to learn and are taking the right steps by first asking questions and not just running out and buying a boat. People who do that usually end up hating it, or getting in serious trouble. The best approach is to go slow and learn. Start small and move up.

So where do they go?

My first recommendations are: read, read, read, and take a boating course.

Recommended reading:

Boating Magazines: they can be found at any book store or newsstand or the library. There are lots of them. Just keep reading until you decide what you are interested in. This will introduce you to the wide world of boats and you will pick up a lot of the language of boats.

Books:

Chapmans Piloting, Seamanship and Small Boat Handling. This can be found in any library or bookstore. It is the bible of boating. Everything you need to know to get started is in there. If you decide to take up boating you will want your own copy. As of 2010 it is in its 64th edition. But one a few years

older is just as good. You can find used ones at used book stores and thrift shops.

The Nature of Boats, Dave Gerr: A good introduction to how boats are designed and built, and a lot of history of boats. This book will answer a lot of questions, such as: what's the difference between a boat and a yacht?

The Complete Sailor, Learning the Art Of Sailing David Seidman

Last, but no way least: talk to boat owners. The quickest way to get rides on boats is to volunteer to help a friend work on their boat. There are routine tasks that need doing, cleaning, painting, varnishing, changing engine oil etc. Volunteer to be crew on sailboats, even if it's as the cook. Hang out at boat yards and talk to people working on their boats (don't bother the yard workers they have a job to do, even though they will most likely be happy to talk to you.)
